Dear friends,

"We have nothing to fear, except fear itself". Why does a miser hide his money? For the same reason that the third man in Jesus's parable of the talents buried his one talent, rather than using it, as did the other two with theirs. He was afraid of losing it, or being robbed. He played safe and so gained nothing.

This is what fear does, it paralyses you. If we all gave way to fear nothing would get done and our fears would be realized like the misers. Fearing to lose his wealth, he lives as though in abject poverty. That is why the great President of the USA, Franklin D Roosevelt entitled his auto-biography, 'We have Nothing to Fear, Except Fear Itself'.

Jesus advises us to 'be like little children'. When very young they experience fear but overcome it by their trust in Mum and Dad. Holding Dad's hand their fear fades; their confidence and courage to face the world is strengthened by trust in the parent's love and care. Jesus also assured us, that 'perfect love casts out fear'. With 'love shared amongst us', faithfully and constantly,

we can be brave and bold, especially when it is the greatest love of all, Jesus's love.

Does there seem to be more to be afraid of in the present world than ever before? Almost like living in a primitive jungle, danger on every side. What a wonderful gift Christians have found in Jesus, and in the greatest Father of us all.

**perfect love casts
out fear**

"Put your hand into the hand of God. That shall be to you better than a lighted path and safer than a known way".

Up to a few years ago the hymn, "In heavenly love abiding", was a favourite choice to sing at funerals, which was quite the opposite of why the author wrote it, in 1850. Anna Letitia Waring, a Welsh woman, was a devout Christian, and for many years a supporter of the Discharged Prisoners Aid Society, visiting prisoners in jail. She wrote the hymn for them in the hope of helping them to face an unknown future after the harsh life of prison.

Did you know?....

Judas window installed at Dorset church 14 years after artist's death

Parishioners appalled at subject and strangeness of the image originally rejected artist Laurence Whistler's valuable gift

On the side of a Dorset church shaded by the graveyard trees, a window as dark and mysterious as a bog pool has just been installed. Visitors peer at the black glass – until suddenly, in shock, they see the sinister image: a man hanging from the branch of a tree, **coins spilling from his hand and turning into flowers as they hit the ground.**

The space is blocked on the inside by a wall monument, so the window is visible only from outside the church. It depicts Judas, the betrayer of Christ, the disciple who the gospels relate hanged himself in shame after throwing away the 30 pieces of silver he was paid for his treachery.

It is the creation of the glass artist Laurence Whistler, and it has finally been installed 14 years after Whistler's death and almost 30 years after the parishioners, appalled at the subject and the strangeness of the image, rejected his valuable gift.

The rector, Jacqueline Birdseye, who led the move to bring Judas back to the church, believes it has become **a symbol of reconciliation** in the parish as well as in the wider context intended by the artist.

"The parochial church council had 20 years to get used to the idea, and the gift of hindsight, so we were able to wait until the right time to make an unhurried decision about introducing the window," she said. "It was important for us that the decision was unanimous, so that we could move forward with confidence and without dissention. We have had nothing but positive comments made by visitors since the installation."

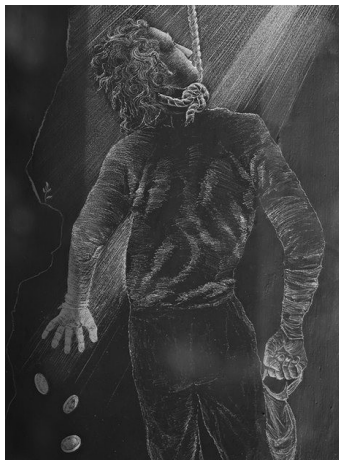
